Dewey Pettry (15 January 1899 Dry Creek-14 July 1978 Veteran's Hospital, Beckley) was the illegitimate son of Lillian Mae Belle Pettry and Philip Sheridan Price. Dewey married (25 December 1924) Icie Marie Williams (21 February 1906 Bald Knob-11 February 2000 Germantown, OH), the daughter of Charles Logan and Sarah L. (Webb) Williams. Dewey's headstone inscription is; "Dewey Pettry Pvt. US Army WWI 15 January 1899, 14 July 1978", and he is buried in the Pettry Cemetery at Dry Creek. Dewey, who inherited the looks and stature of the Price family, had no middle name, but some times used the name, George, as a first name.

Lillian Mae Belle Pettry (29 May 1881 Dry Creek – 30 June 1919 of TB, Dry Creek) the daughter of Ella Mae Pettry and Charles Alexander Burnside. Belle married (Jan. 1910) Rev. Charles Wesley Pettry of Dempsy, near Oak Hill, WV. Rev Charles W. Pettry (~1856~1946), the son of Oliver H. and Sarah Ann (Butts) Perry, married #1 (10 Feb, 1876) Mary Elizabeth Beckenheimer (1855~bef. 1910), the daughter of William Isaac and Sarah Beckenheimer, and raised a family before marrying Belle. Rev. Perry and Belle first lived at Dempsey, but left the area hoping to find a cure for her TB. Dad and Artie lived with them for a short time. Dad left after a few months and walked back to Dry Creek alone at 12 years old, Artie stayed a few years before returning to Ella at Dry Creek. Rev. Perry and Belle lived for a short time at Cincinnati, Gallipolis and Akron, OH, he working for the Presbyterian Church. The following is Belle's obituary.

#### Dies of Tuberculosis

Mrs. Belle Perry, wife of C.W. Perry died at home at Dry Creek on June 30, 1919, of tuberculosis from the ravages of which she had been a sufferer for some time. Mrs. Perry was 39 years of age and the mother of two children. Her husband is a Fayette County man. They had been living in the west for some years, but came east to Akron, Ohio and then to Dry Creek only a few weeks before Mrs. Perry's death.

Dad was reared by his grandmother, Ella, at Dry Creek and attended Muddy Lynn School though the third grade. Muddy Lynn School was a one-room schoolhouse located at the forks of Sturgeon Fork and Dry Creek. He taught himself to read and learned enough math to run his business. He once told me that he was about ten years old when he found out that most people did not receive their clothes and shoes from the Presbyterian barrel. He joined the army at age 15 for 5 years. While in the army, he was stationed at Syracuse, New York, San Antonio and on the Mexican border, Texas, Columbia, SC, and Newport News, VA. While stationed at Newport News waiting to be shipped overseas, he was severely food poisoned. His mother, May Belle, died of TB, 30 June 1919, while he was in the army. After returning from the army, he worked for a while at many different coalmines before working at the Princess Dorothy Coal Company, in Eunice, WV. He

worked at Eunice for about 25 years before retiring to work-full time in his general mercantile store where he was the Postmaster at Packsville, WV. Dad bought the Packsville General Store from Jessie Dorn and Annie Peters with final payment on 6 January 1945. He rented the store to Miller E. Pauley for a few years before taking over and running it on 2 October 1946. After marrying on 25 December 1924, by Rev. Jordan Peters, he and Mom lived for a short time with his half-sister, Artie (1.13.4.8. 2), at Eunice and later moved into a log house near Mom's parents home at Pettus. A short time later, they moved to Packsville. On 6 June 1927 they bought a home in Packsville from Wood and Rushis Jarrell where they reared their family. At Packsville, Dewey turned his hobby, beekeeping, into a business and possibly became the largest beekeeper and honey producer in WV and mid-Atlantic Coast states also.

When Dad was in the 3rd grade, for punishment for some kind of school infraction, he had to keep the fire in a potbelly stove going during the day. As he was putting wood into the fire he slipped some .22 caliber shell into the fire. For doing this he was kicked out of school and never returned. Many years later, his schoolteacher, at that time, visited us and stayed all night with us when we lived at Packsville. This was the night that the northern lights gave their biggest display that I can ever remember.

As a child, Uncle Charlie Pap, and Dad made home-brew whiskey. Being young, Dad would deliver the home-brew in an old suitcase case. On one such winter delivery to Cabin Creek, he left Peach Tree Hollow early one morning before daylight to travel to Edwight to catch the train. While coming down the hollow he heard a noise in the brush off the side of the road. Pulling his pistol, he ordered the man to come into the road where he could see him. The man was drunk and had fallen off the road. Dad, with pistol in hand, made him carry the heavy suitcase case with home-brew for him to Edwight. As they came to creek crossings on the way, Dad made the man first carry the suitcase case to the other side of the river then return and carry him to the other side. At Edwight, Dad caught the train to Cabin Creek where he was to deliver the home-brew.

Charlie Franklin Pettry, (Uncle Charlie Pap) was my father's uncle, but they were reared together more as brothers. About 3 or 4 days after Dad came home from the army, they were arrested when the revenue law enforcers raided Grandma Ellen's home and found some of Charlie's home-brew. Although Dad was innocent, at this time, the law took them to Marmet, WV to jail. That night, Charlie started a fight in the cell that they shared with other prisoners. The jailers turned a high-pressure hose of water on them to stop the fight. Dad said he thought he would drown for a while as the cell filled full of water and the pressure kept knocking him down. Because Charlie was the only male in the family and he had a job, on the railroad, it was decided that Dad would take the rap. Charlie was let free the next morning to go to work and Dad remained in jail. Later Dad was sentenced to serve time as a Federal prisoner. He was sent to Hinton, WV where the Federal Government paid the city to keep some of their prisoners. Here the jailor would let Dad out each morning after breakfast to roam the town but Dad spent most of his time fishing in New River. Dad had entered the army at the age of 15 and was medically discharged at 20 years old. Dad was no stranger to making home-brew and he had served time in an army brig in Texas.

Dad was the only person I know in WV who had been a Federal prisoner and had served time for making home-brew, and also served time in an army brig, to be appointed U.S. Postmaster (of Packsville) and given a permit to carry a gun.

One day in 1962, while visiting home after I had finished college and had been married for 9 years, we were riding in his pick-up truck. He asked when Nancy and I were going to start having children. I said that I could not afford children and may have some children some day when I could afford it. He said that if he had waited until he could afford children, "none of you kids would have been born." After a long silence, he said seriously, "A grandson is worth \$1,000.00 to me".

Laughing, I said, "You can't pick boy or girl -- how much is a girl worth"? "Well", -- he said laughingly after he realized how and what he had said, "A girl is worth \$500.00". Nothing more was said about this conversation after that. About three years later, Nancy got pregnant with Jamie. A week before Christmas we received a Christmas card from Mom, signed by Mom as always saying "Love, Mom and Dad." Two days later, we received another Christmas card, this one with Dad's handwriting on it. When I opened it, a check fell out onto the floor. Nancy picked it up, and I said they must be sending all their kids money for Christmas. The check was for \$500.00. On the card, Dad had written, "1st payment on a grandson." I still have the Christmas card in my safety deposit box. Granddaughter Jamie was born the next June.

Dad was either liked or disliked, but was respected by everyone. Most people in Packsville came to him for advice and help. He was very critical of most people who failed to work or act properly. He was a hard worker and believed that it was the responsibility of parents to provide for their children. He always had respect for old people and trusted young people. He often gave a line of credit in his store to young people, even teenagers. Small children were his favorite; I believe he kept penny candy in his store just to give to children. I remember near Christmas time, he would load up his pick-up truck with food and commodities from the store, and with a stack of \$20.00 bills, he would visit old people he knew when he was young. We would carry a box of food into their home, and after visiting awhile, upon leaving, he would give them one or two \$20.00 bills. This happened in the late 1940's and early 1950's when \$20.00 was worth something.

Dad enjoyed reading, fishing, hunting and traveling in that order. I remember him taking me squirrel hunting when I was too small to carry a gun. Mom and Dad would dress me while I was asleep in the morning before the sun came up. After placing me in a box or in the back of a truck, Dad sometimes would drive for hours to the hunting area. While still asleep, he would carry me on his shoulder into the woods. He always had something for me to eat after waking up. I had the smallest gun available at that time. Even so, the gun was too large for me to hold and shoot. I would have to place it on Dad's shoulder or a bush branch to aim and shoot. It was a single barrel 20-gage shotgun.

Dad bought a fishing camp in the town of Meadow Creek on New River in Summers County in 1951 and later bought the home of Thomas and Zama (Akers) Roads, where he and Mom retired in 1965. At Meadow Creek, they fished, gardened and traveled some in WV.

I am always amazed at the fact that Dad built the garage at Meadow Creek, by himself, after he was 68 years old. If you notice the walls, you will see that they are not built with 2 X 4 framing, as is the practice for today's carpenters. The sides hold themselves up. This was the practice of old time building years earlier.

In 1953, Dad developed muscular fibrosis, which almost proved fatal to him. After suffering a number of years with this condition, he accredited his cure with quinine sulfate tablets and a pint of whiskey. He said that one day, as was his practice of sitting in the yard under an apple tree, he asked

John Sparks, his son-in-law, could he pick-up a pint of whiskey in Whitesville for him. Dad told him that he felt he was getting a cold and could use a pint of whiskey to combat the oncoming cold.

Dad, like most old timers, took quinine sulfate for everything. Quinine and aspirin were the miracle drugs of his generation. The rest of that day, he took quinine sulfate and drank the pint of whiskey.

The next day, he felt so good that he was able to get out of bed without any help and walked unaided throughout the house. With another pint of whiskey and more quinine that day, it cured his cold and set him on to recovery from the crippling effects of muscular fibrosis. He later developed diabetes but was able to control it with diet and pills. He never fully recovered from these two illnesses, but he lived an active life until he had a stroke in 1978.

Dad died as a result of a stroke in the Veterans' Hospital at Beckley and is buried in the Pettry Cemetery at Dry Creek, WV. The Pettry Cemetery is about 200 feet away from the one-room log house where he was born. The service was held at the Armstrong Funeral Home at Whitesville with Kenna French (12 January 1901-10 August 1988), a family friend, officiating.

The last time I saw Dad alive was about 3 days before he died in the Veterans' Hospital at Beckley. Jr. and I had walked into his room to visit. Dad could not talk because of the stroke and they had him propped up in bed with a respirator, which helped him to breathe. Dad looked directly at me and with his hand made a motion to me, which I knew what he meant. He wanted me to have them to take away the respirator and let him die. He wanted me to keep my promise to him to not keep him alive when all hope was gone. I failed to do anything; I turned away and left the room.

Mary Irene Pettry (1.13.4.4.1.4)

Mary Irene (27 December 1931 Packsville, WV-16 June 1932 Charleston, WV of spinal meningitis at age 6 months) is buried in the Pettry Cemetery at Dry Creek. Dr. John Pindar, a Presbyterian Minister, presided over her funeral.

Mary Irene became sick early in the morning, giving no sign of illness the night before. Dad and Mom took her to a doctor in Whitesville and then on to a hospital at Charleston. Later that day she died. Dad and Mon called the Valley Funeral Home at Whitesville for a hearse to bring Mary Irene's body to Whitesville to prepare it for burial. The funeral home sent a hearse with a driver and a helper. After waiting many hours for the hearse to arrive, Dad and Mom, with Mary Irene's body wrapped in a blanket, drove back to Whitesville. On their way, they found the hearse and the two drivers at a beer joint at the top of Lens Creek Mountain. The drivers had stopped to drink a beer, stayed and got drunk. Mom held Mary Irene's body in her lap from Charleston to Whitesville, at that time the trip took near two hours.
